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


HARRISBURG REGION

Upcoming events include a Holiday party in December. Look for details to come out shortly in an E-Flash. 





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
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North Jersey

Attending were the Kessens, Kaltnecker, Valentis, Landsmans, Bill Smith, Patrick Henry, John Moore, Pat Venezia, Andy Smith, Ralph Scarfogliero, Ray Carr, Theo Padavano, and Steve Feld. Several members won awards, the most noteworthy being Josh and Rita Landsman whose 1952 Jaguar XK120 took home the Best in Show Award as well as winning its class. Pat Venezia's 1965 BJ8 won 2nd place among Big Healeys. Second place awards also went to Bill Smith for his 1972 TR-6 and to Ray Carr for his Triumph Spitfire. The event was a wonderful end to the 2022 British car show season in New Jersey."

He came in his recently acquired red MGB roadster which he has restored. He converted it from rubber bumpers to chrome, and also repaired the floors. Rich also has an early BJ8 that belonged to an AHSTC member from New Jersey. He hopes to finish work on the Healey soon.

Rally driver Paddy Hopkirk passed away in July at the age of 89. Born in Belfast, Northern Ireland, he began his driving career at age nine in a motorcycle engine powered bath chair. Later on he campaigned a couple of VW Beetles, and by 1956 was offered a job as a works driver for Standard Motor (Triumph). In 1959 he drives for Rootes, driving Sunbeam Rapiers. He took a spin in Pat Moss' Healey 300 and was hooked on the Big Healey rally car's power. By 1962 he was a works driver for BMC and was successfully competing in





Big Healeys. But be careful what you wish for. "The Healey in its ultimate form was very quick but it was far from easy to drive on tight and loose surface downhill sections. I'm not ashamed to say that there were many occasions when I was scared." Imagine your Big Healey with 200hp and the skinny tires, say 165/80/15s or 5.90x15s. That was the problem in a nutshell. Too much power and not enough tire. Paddy was more comfortable in Sprites and Midgets and the ultimate rally car of the time, the front drive Mini. He drove a number of MGBs entered by BMC in 1963, 1964 and 1965 at LeMans. The MGB always finished but with a top speed of 125 mph or a little more, it was not competitive. Paddy became an expert at slip streaming, staying close behind a faster car to minimize wind resistance. Finally, the difference in top speed between the MGB and faster cars ended the MGBs competing at LeMans. Paddy had an after market Mini business selling all manner of improvements in power and handling. He sold a large throttle pedal in the shape of a human foot. I bought one from Moss for my Midget but never used it. The Sprites and Midgets had a real gas pedal hinged on the floor. I found it was easier to just use the arm hanging in space. Paddy's obituary was in Revcounter's September 2022 issue and the quotes were from contemporary interviews published in Safety Fast and were reproduced in the *MG Driver* November/December 2022 issue. Paddy was a fun guy with the gift of blarney, and was always one of my heroes.

I hope everyone has been making good use of their Healey on some of the beautiful fall days we've had! Remember to share some pictures and news of what you've been up to. We're hoping to have our post holiday party as usual but will need a new place for it as Orlando's is out of business, just like the diner we have used after the beach run in the summer.

And a reminder, there is no Flash in December.

The Popular Car Show was held on a weather-blessed Wednesday afternoon along Main St. in historic downtown Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania. The Co-Chairs of Enclave 2022 through the management of Pocono Mountains Visitors Bureau began contacting town officials early in the planning of Enclave 2022 so that the town could see the benefits of promoting the event. The town officials and local businesses eagerly participated in planning, organizing and executing the show which closed several blocks of its Main St. They even convinced the state to close the state highway so that the display of our Healeys from all over the country could occur in the center of town. We thank our sponsors, Autofarm, Ltd., and A Head 4 Healeys, for their support of this event.

After gathering in a staging area a couple blocks from Main St., about 200 Healeys paraded to model designated locations on Main St. and in front of the county courthouse. Austin Healey 100s as our featured model at Enclave 2022 were positioned in line along the center of Main Street.

The many restaurants and shops along Main St. saw a great influx of Healey owners savoring their menus and perusing, and hopefully, buying, their goods. 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ENGLISH TEA



Concours judging at Enclave was just like everything else at Enclave 2022---HUGE. We had a very large turnout of entrant cars which taxed our judging personnel resources. A total of 33 people agreed to help us with the judging and scoring effort.


