

his recent Father's Day reminded me how our car culture is alive and well, though ever changing. I attended one of the many car shows that take place on this day for dads. This one was in downtown Summit, NJ, and saw 300-400 cars of all types and vintages lined up to mark their owners' passion for their rides. For two hours a steady line of cars arrived to enter the blocked-off streets for the show. Thousands of spectators, including many families strolled through the show which has become an annual event. This was a Cars & Croissants get-together which lasted only for three hours allowing the rest of the day for other activities.

There was a huge selection of Ferraris, Lamborghinis, McLarens and innumerable Porsches along with a smattering of Astons. A dozen Cobra replicas (recreations?) showed the coordination of their club efforts. Unusual models such as a Buick Roadmaster convertible, Saab 99E, AMC Javelin, Toyota Cresta (a JDM model recently imported) appealed to the more eclectic. If any daily drivers were present, I must have missed them.

North Jersey AHSTC members were well represented with at least seven members attending, six with their cars. These included four Big Healeys, a Jaguar E-Type and an award winning 1932 Dodge pick-up.

I mention this show because it demonstrated again what most Healeys owners have experienced when participating in a multi-marque car show. The Healey may be parked between a Lambo and a model with a prancing horse logo. However, a passerby will likely linger longer at the Healey and strike up a conversation with the Healey owner more so than the owners of the exotics. My view is that the classic, appealing lines of a Healey are only part of the reason. The other part is approachability and relatability. The person himself or a father, uncle or friend of the person once owned a Healey (or other LBC) and reminisces about the Healey. Even for children, viewing a Healey produces smiles, even more so if you let them sit in it. These responses are rarely the case with the adjacent exotics.

The bottom line is that our Healeys are kind of warm and fuzzy! Don't we owe it to the public to get our Healeys out as much as we can? Eliciting fond memories benefits all!

A display consisting of eight of the surviving 49 vehicles was followed by a Tucker drive around the Museum grounds.

As Healey fans, we can all appreciate the amazing engineering advancements that went into these beautiful automobiles. Like Preston Tucker, Donald Healey dreamed of building an automobile with timeless styling and outstanding performance- something that woiuld stand out from the ordinary. Although Tucker's dream ended in bankruptcy, his performance and safety innovations live on in nearly every car on the road today, such as 4-wheel disc brakes, safety glass, rear-engine, the first auto transmission, step down chassis with a low center of gravity, and an elastomeric suspension, to name a few.



Preston Tucker's descendants, including his great grandsons, were on hand to discuss the history of the company as well as the technological advancements. The highlight of the day was, of course, being able to watch these cars running and being driven, a rare sight indeed!

"How a routine Tech Session turned into a bit of an adventure"

Randywine held a Tech Session on Saturday July 1st at Chuck Ott's garage. Chuck's facility is equipped with a car lift, refrigerator, and air conditioner.

So, it is not surprising that three members brought their Healeys for service and/or inspection. Mind you the intentions were routine. My car was in for an oil and filter change. Buzz Marshall's for a swap out of an alternator for his generator. Jim Martin wanted to inspect his car's front end for anything "loose". All were BJ8 models.

As most of you know, routine items can quickly develop into the unexpected. Upon arrival at Chuck's, my car exhibited a significant gasoline leak from one of the carburetor drains. This was diagnosed as a leaky carburetor diaphragm. The advice was (a) you were lucky you didn't break down and/or have a fire on the way, and (b) the car will stay at Chuck's until repaired.

The next straight forward project was to replace Buzz's generator with the new alternator that he had purchased years ago but had not yet installed. Removal of the old and installation of the new proceeded well enough in spite of some difficulties. Now for the final electrical hook up of the new alternator. Not so fast! The accompanying instructions left a lot wanting. It was decided to seek guidance from the vendor in the coming week so as not to risk serious equipment damage. Another "dead" Healey.

Due to the above unexpected happenings, no inspection of Jim's car





took place. Next time for sure. My battery was placed in Buzz's car as an emergency power supply if his battery went dead on his way home. He gave me a ride to near my home since it was along the same route to his house. This was my first ride as a passenger in a BJ8, and in one that was running off a battery that was not being charged. No problems occurred, and both Buzz and I made it home safely. A rather adventurous Tech Session!

My Green Sprite

y Sprite story begins in the summer of 2016. I have always loved cars, especially older cars, but I wasn't looking for a car at this time. As fate would have it, my little 1963 HAN7 Mk2 British Racing Green Sprite found me.

A friend of mine was storing the car in his garage for a friend of his. The ironic thing is that my friend took me for a ride in this car back in 2010. The car ran terribly then and even stalled out a few times on our ride. Who knew that 6 years later I would buy the car?

In 2016 the owner had to move out of state and needed to sell the car. With some prodding from my 16-year-old son, and after looking over the car again, I knew I had to have her. The owner told me the car hadn't run in 5 or 6 years (in fact, the 2010 drive that my friend took me on might have been the last time the car ran). He said the car had mechanical issues, didn't run, but the body and paint were in great shape. My son was excited about the car, and I thought this would be a great project for us to work on together. I bought the car for \$1,500 just the way it looks in the pictures...great body work and a great paint job.

The owner handed me all kinds of extra stuff for her (small parts, tons of nuts, bolts, and washers, etc.). He also gave me a thick book of pictures and receipts that explained her history a bit. What I found out was that my new Sprite spent many years in Germany. She may have even been shipped there after she was built. Pictures of a complete frame-off restoration around 1989 and the receipts in German proved it! I was hoping to gain a deeper understanding of all the restoration work that was done on her, but my German is limited to a handful of words.

One of the first things I did once I got her to my house was join a local Austin Healey club. It was one of the best decisions I have made and I'm so glad I did. There were quite a few members who knew their way around the different Austin Healey's and the "sprite square body" in particular. It boosted my confidence.

So, in June 2016, with her in my garage, I started exploring and researching all I could. What I didn't know was that the motor, transmission, and differential were all seized. There was no way this motor was going to turn over without major help. So, I did what any other rational car nut would do...I started taking her apart.

Over the next two years (2016-2018), I rebuilt every mechanical part - the motor, transmission, differential, suspension, brakes, wheel hubs, etc. Actually, the differential

and transmission I had rebuilt by a very good friend of mine who is a master mechanic. But everything else I did myself (strange how this "father and son" project turned into a "father" project, since my son was now into trucks). But I was determined to get her running and drive her.

During this time, there were two moments when I was really nervous about what I was doing. The first was actually getting the rebuilt motor back in the car! Taking stuff apart is the easy part, but putting it back together is a different story. With the



motor mostly back together, a tech session with my Healey club members on a Saturday morning helped put the motor and transmission back in her within 2-3 hours. What a relief that was! Thank goodness there were a bunch of guys who knew more about this than I did.

The second time I was nervous was when I fired up the engine for the first time. Not being a trained mechanic and this being my first engine rebuild, there was a lot to be nervous about. There were so many questions running through my head - Did I torque everything properly? Did I forget a gasket anywhere? Did I assemble everything in the right order? But to my amazement, after the second turn of the key, the engine fired up and roared to life. My face lit up! She could run!

Finally, it was time to take her for a test drive. In August 2018 after being held hostage for two years in my garage, and 5-6 years in my buddy's garage, my little green Sprite rolled out of my garage under her own power. I slowly drove her down my driveway and around the block (of course without the bonnet attached) and to my pure pleasure, everything worked!

Initially, I was apprehensive about taking it too far from the house. I didn't want to get stranded if something broke. But as time went on, I grew more comfortable with my Sprite and now enjoy driving her on weekends and to club events.



ou would be surprised how often Austin Healey Sprites can be found on various auction sites, albeit mostly they are found in on-line auctions, in my experience. These cars offer an immersive driving experience, modest upkeep and a loyal following among sports car enthusiasts. As usual I have provided the links to the actual auctions on Bring a Trailer. The comments are fun to follow, and there are always tons of photos. The comments can also be very informative as long as they are constructive.

The little red 1965 Sprite caught my eye as it reminded me of the car the AHSTC auctioned off, for charity, at Enclave last summer. This car appears to be in better condition and has a few tasteful upgrades including a 5-speed trans and a weber carb. But especially interesting is that it has been with the same family since the 70's! This car sold for \$9,345 including the buyer's premium.
