




To wrap up the tail end of 2022, I had to dig down a bit to find my notes (I've already shifted them to the bottom half of the pile, as I am now in the process of filling out my calendar for next – oops! this - year). Since I didn't have to write an article for November (which would have been due the day after Turkey Day), this one should try to cover both November and December (and is due on Christmas morning – Merry Christmas, Steve!). In all honesty, I do have other plans for Christmas eve, so in between waxing the runners on the old sleigh, fixing the centuries-old harness, and mending my ancient lap blanket, I figured the best option was to try to get a jump start on hacking this thing out. A few days early. Let's see how that works out.

Let's see if we can start off with the monthly club meeting for November, which was held on Tuesday night, the 8th, with John Moore, JIM VOLLMUTH (BJ8), Paul Rust, Steve & Ann Feld, Tom Mulligan, Steve Jekogian, Allen Rosenberg, Bob Jankowitz, Larry Gersten, and Denise & George Crombie in attendance. Steve Feld reported on the results of the elections at the Corporate level (hint: Steve Feld is now the President of AHSTC; Dave Siwa is Vice President). North Jersey Region re-elected Steve Feld as Regional President, Larry Gersten as Treasurer, and George Crombie as Newsletter hack. The nominations (and votes) were almost unanimously accepted with hardly a whimper heard. Also covered were the dates of the annual Polar Run (scheduled for December 3rd, but postponed to the following day, due to rain), the annual Holiday Party (scheduled for the following Saturday, December 10th, but postponed until sometime in July due to somebody's chestnuts roasting on an open fire and getting a little

out of control...), and the announcement that the next monthly meeting would be held on January 10th at The Vintage Tavern in Gillette. The rest of the evening was spent socializing (appropriately distanced – yeah, right!) and having such a great time that the staff at Vintage Tavern almost had to throw us out. But since we had them outnumbered ten to seven, we managed to force a draw. After another drink or two, we agreed to leave peacefully. Or something like that.

Next up on the calendar was the annual Polar Run. Scheduled for Saturday, December 3rd, this year we utilized a rain date and it was a good call, as Saturday was a washout; cold, wet, and dreary. Sunday, on the other



hand, turned out to be fabulous! A bit on the cool side, crisp and clear. This year, we had ten hardy souls occupying two AN9s (Theo Padavano, and Sarah & George Crombie), a BT7 (Steve Feld), a BJ7 (John & Jeff Moore), a BJ8 (Patrick & Lauren Venezia), and two BJ9s (Steve Jekogian 'Vette, and our sweeper Denise Crombie, Chevy). The route that was laid out covered 42 miles, and took just over an hour to navigate. No one strayed, no rescues were needed, and everyone pretty much stayed together. The occasional interloper was quickly singled out and banished. Lunch was held at Thirsty's Restaurant and Tavern on Route 202 North in Branchburg.



The Regional Holiday Party, scheduled for Saturday, December 10th at the Jekogians' home in Chester, NJ, was called off, and rescheduled for sometime in July. That puts us pretty much right up to the Holidays, which in turn, takes us to the dawning of a brand, new year, and leads us right into the pre-dawn hours of, you guessed it: January 10th and the first monthly club meeting of 2023. Funny how all of that circles back around and leads us back to the beginning. Man, is that getting heavy.

A little fill-in and update is due. In early November, Saturday the 12th actually, Ralph Scarfogliero came over to help me figure out some wiring issues on my BN2. I had already pulled out the generator and taken it down to a generator and electrical repair shop in Somerville to have it tested and repaired. I was hoping to have the generator back and reinstalled by this time, but no such luck. Anyway, I had the front end of the BN2 up on jack stands and had just finished my second cup of coffee when Ralph pulled in. After a few minutes checking the wiring diagram, Ralph grabbed his test light and disappeared under the front of the Healey to see what he could find wrong. The goal, as you could guess, was to test the stop light switch, located on the right front frame rail, inboard of the wheel well. The switch was there where it was supposed to be, but there were no wires connected to it. We both concurred: With no wires connected, chances were pretty good that the switch would not be able to do its job. So, where the heck did the wires go to?

After consulting the wiring diagram again, Ralph checked the wires coming down from the harness at the left front corner, and saw that a group of wires came down and were gathered together in a bundle and wrapped up and zip-tied to the front cross member. In this bundle were the two wires that were supposed to go to the stop light switch. After a bit of grunting (or was that groaning?) - that was my contribution, Ralph got the wires separated, stripped, and reattached. A quick check, and we have brake lights! The next step was to see if the turn signals worked. Nope; the three-terminal flasher unit tested as defective. I jotted the part number for that on my note pad to be ordered.



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Next, we moved on to the overdrive. After going through the motions of testing the throttle switch on the bulkhead, and checking the 30-W NON-detergent gearbox oil (the fluid level felt good to me – I could feel it with my little finger), Ralph insisted that we do it the right way: take the car off the jack stands, get it level, and try it again. Then off came the carpet over the transmission tunnel, then the tranny tunnel cover itself. The fluid was down almost a full quart. Then he tested the solenoid. A lot of caked on grease. I didn't want to start the car to check the operation, as the generator is still out being rebuilt, so we called it a day. Ralph gave me a list of homework to do.

After seven or eight weeks with no response from the generator shop in Somerville, I picked it up and sent it off to a generator repair shop in Maryland. I expect to have it rebuilt and back by the first part of January. Then all I need is one or two somewhat warm afternoons to get it installed, scrape the grease and gunk off the tranny, get some insulation installed under the transmission tunnel cover, and replace the flasher unit (different from the flasher relay) and test the turn signals, and I'll be ready for the next list of problems to be solved. Then I'll have to address the lack of power issues with the AN9. It never ends, does it? I'll have to let you know how it goes.

IT'S TIME FOR THE SPRITE!

Arguably the single most successful Austin-Healey, the MK1 Sprite out sold 100s, 100-6s, and 3000s. The Sprite model in its four generations went on to outsell all other Austin-Healey models combined by almost two to one despite the 3000 being in production for six additional years.

The 100s and 3000s are the undisputed icons of the Healey brand with the Sprite often just an afterthought, but the above numbers beg the question - Why?

Speed? Sure, no production Sprite has ever done 100 MPH, but how many of us have ever done 100 MPH in an Austin-Healey?

Styling/Design? I'll give you that the 100s are sexy, especially when compared to other cars in 1952... but that is arguably not a time period associated with sleek, sexy automotive design.*

Luggage capacity? Not a strength of the Austin-Healey brand in general with capacity of the boot similar across models. Granted, the MK1 boot was difficult to access, but that was rectified on later models.

Size? Size doesn't matter. Unless, that is, you're looking for toss-able fun. How many big Healeys have ever been described as "toss-able"?

Donald Healey's intention for the Sprite was to design a smaller, less expensive sports car that "a chap could put in his bike shed." "Performance, Economy, and Safety" was the advertising slogan of the time. An article from one of the sales brochures stated: "Constructionally, the accent is on safety. Independent front suspension, hydraulic shock absorbers, rack and pinion steering and an extremely low centre of gravity are some of the features which add emphasis to the grip-tight road-holding qualities of this two-seater." All very true. The "Safety" however, being inferred by its ability for "grip-tight road-holding

qualities.” No mention is made of the thin gauge sheet steel being the only barrier between your elbow and any other vehicle. Situation avoidance rather than situation survivability.

It is harder to argue with the “Performance” and “Economy” claims. Smaller and more toss-able than it’s bigger brothers, the Sprite was roughly a 25% reduction in performance when compared to the 100 at a 40% savings in cost. As one advertising slogan of the time put it, it was: “The car that offers so much...for so little”!


The word “cute” is often associated with the Sprite. Merriam-Webster also offers a brief history on the evolution of the word “Cute”: “The contraction cute first appears in the early 18th century...but only a century later does it begin to take on its distinctive modern meaning; even after 1900 children were still being called cute as a compliment to their intelligence.

I like to think that those who chose Sprites over their bigger kin were exhibiting a certain intelligence, but I also agree with the modern definition of cute as it relates to the Sprite. It’s impossible to be out in the car and not notice all of the smiles and “thumbs up” from everyone you pass or sit next to at a stop light. And I can’t begin to count the number of times someone, grinning ear to ear, has told me how they, their brother, sister, uncle, or best friend in high school used to have one of these back in the day and how much fun it was!

The Sprite tech session at Enclave this year was one of the most well attended tech sessions of the week and exhibited the interest and enthusiasm for the Sprite model. Jeff Porada of The Winner’s Circle <https://www.spridget.com/> and David Silberkleit of Bugeyeguy <https://www.bugeyeguy.com> combined to give an excellent talk on their respective specialties. Jeff covered the various performance upgrades available, uwhich were appropriate for the street and which were better suited to the track. While David discussed the many reliability upgrades that help keep our cars on the road as opposed to sitting on jack stands in the garage waiting to be repaired. After each concluded their initial presentations, there were several questions from those in attendance that carried the conversation beyond the scheduled time slot. I was struck not only by the number of attendee’s but also by the enthusiastic discussion and hunger for information on the Sprite model.

This Gerry Coker design deserves to sit along side the 100 as an equal icon of the Austin-Healey brand.

Based on production numbers, it’s not unreasonable to think that there may be more surviving Sprites than any other Austin-Healey model. It would be healthy for our hobby to recognize and promote the Sprite with equal agency in order to help sustain membership levels and interest.
