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





This month we have two 100M's, one sold, and one RNM (reserve not met). 100M's are always fun to follow at auction, particularly the on-line auctions where all manner of "expert" gets to chime in. It seems there is always some doubt as to the authenticity of the car, or at least about the originality of the car. Such is the case with these two beautiful examples, one of which claims to be the best-known factory 100M in the country.

The 1956 white over blue car is claimed to be one of the most recognized 100M's in the country (world) and the seller appears to be the owner of the 100M registry if I infer correctly from the comments. The car is not completely original in the details and sold for \$181k on Bring a Trailer including the buyer's premium. The many discussions in the comments are worth reading as they provide valuable insight into the authentication of 100M's.


The 1956 black over red car was RNM at \$80k. Just going by the photos, this is a very beautiful car with Heritage certificate documentation. But once again the comments and questions sunk this sale. While I'm not passing judgement on the authenticity or the originality of this car (I'll leave that to those of you who are more knowledgeable about 100M's), the comments are worth studying by anyone considering selling a car via an on-line auction. The rarer the car, the better prepared the seller must be. This car was hurt by many small issues rather than any one glaring problem.
