



## Welcome to British Encounter 2025!



his year's Austin Healey Sports & Touring Club (AHSTC) British Encounter 2025 was held at Camelback Resort, Tannersville, PA, nestled in the picturesque Pocono Mountains, truly a fantastic venue with much to offer as a first-class year-round resort and waterpark. Traditionally, September is one of the most beautiful months to visit the Poconos. This year's spectacular weather during Encounter week did not disappoint. Running from September 11 – 14, with plenty of fun stuff to do, this annual Austin Healey owners gettogether promised to be memorable, and it was!

Sixty-eight cars and owners pre-registered for British Encounter 2025. Additional participants registered at the welcome table when they arrived. Registration lasted from 1 to 5pm on Thursday in conference rooms located on the 4th floor of Cam-

elback Lodge. A schedule of events for the week, together with a map of the event floor was provided to attendees for their convenience. The hospitality room was opened, where beer, wine, liquor and snacks were available. Experienced Healey enthusiasts reacquainted and reminisced old times. #### **Tech Session!**

Matt Bakes, owner of Triumph Rescue and British Wiring presented an informative technical talk from 2:30 to 3:30 Thursday on wiring issues of Austin Healey and other British cars, followed by a useful question-and-answer session. Matt did an excellent job and kept the discussion lively. He focused on wiring problems endemic to British cars; the importance of good electrical grounding connections, and how to replace a wiring harness. Matt also displayed a number of broken British car parts he has collected over the years, and relayed past horror stories about the broken parts, taken from his years of repairing British cars and working in the profession. Thank you Matt, and many thanks to Proper Noise for sponsoring this Tech Talk. We also want to thank all participants in this interesting and well-attended event.

#### AHSTC Board Meeting!

Next up after the Tech Talk, the AHSTC Board of Directors met from 4 - 5:30 pm on Thursday afternoon. Attendees were invited to meet the AHSTC executive team and learn more about the organization. As expected Steve Feld, President of AHSTC presided over the meeting.

#### Welcome Reception!

This was British Encounter 2025's kickoff event. Just a short walk down from the Lodge, the formal Welcome Reception was held at Alta Vida Restaurant from 6 to 8pm on Thursday evening. Shuttle busses ferried many of the diners back and forth from the restaurant to the Lodge.

Alta Vida is one of Camelback's in-house restaurants specializing in traditional Mexican dishes but with a modern twist. Light hors d'ouevres of artisan cheese, seasonal fresh fruit, dried fruits and nuts, crostini and sliced baguettes were served. Attendees paid for their meals and drinks, but no one seemed to mind as it was such a good time.

The program got underway with a formal welcome address by Bob Snyder, Co-chairman for British Encounter 2025, and member of AHSTC Lehigh Valley Region. Bob urged everyone to meet up with old Encounter friends, make new ones, and described all the Encounter events to be coming up in the next two days.

The keynote address was given by Mr. Chris Barrett, President & CEO of Pocono Mountains Visitors Bureau. Chris spoke proudly about this part of Pennsylvania, and of the many opportunities for Encounter attendees to enjoy the Pocono Mountains, be it by going on a scenic countryside drive, or to frequent the region's many restaurants, shops, casino, skiing or other sports venues. Also, Chris spoke about his work with the Pocono Mountains United Way and how grateful he was that proceeds from this year's Encounter charity auction would benefit the United Way's many charitable services in the region.

Thank you Bob and Chris, and many thanks to the Pocono Mountains Visitors Bureau for sponsoring our Welcome Reception. We also want to thank all participants who enjoyed this delicious and warm, friendly event.

#### Scenic Tours Rallye!

Again this year, the Scenic Tours Rallye event in the British Encounter 2025 schedule proved popular with attendees. One of the great benefits of this year's venue was the vast number of beautiful country roads available to explore the Pocono Mountains.

Designed as a series of self-guided driving tours, participants driving their own Austin Healey or other British classic car, headed out Friday morning onto the road, driving at a leisurely pace, and following a

scenic drive guidebook prepared by Encounter organizers, following different routes to some of the most beautiful locations in the Pocono Mountains. Approximately 25 cars competed; each vehicle, with its driver and navigator would take between two and two and half hours to complete the approximate 45-mile routes. Additionally, participants were asked to answer pre-written questions while navigating along the way. The routes didn't include planned rests, although participants were encouraged to stop at especially scenic points, and all routes ended back at Camelback Lodge. Naturally a few twists and turns not shown in the guidebook were thrown at the cars just to make trips more interesting.

The guidebooks were prepared in a spiral-bound format making it easy for Rallye teams to follow as they traversed the countryside. Each book included detailed turn-by-turn directions to a destination and return. Route designers intended each route would avoid major highways and poor-quality roads. Selected destinations, together with distance from Camelback Lodge and expected travel time to get there, were as follows:

Top of Big Pocono (Camelback Mountain) – 4 miles, 7 minutes

Skytop Lodge – 22 miles, 37 minutes

Bushkill Falls – 37 miles, 59 minutes

Jim Thorpe, PA - 35 miles, 50 minutes

Lake Wallenpaupack – 40 miles, 62 minutes

Delaware Water Gap, PA – 22 miles, 42 minutes

Prior to departure, drivers and their navigators were encouraged to attend the so called "Rallye School" to learn Rallye rules, and have their questions answered. This session was presented in a Conference Center Friday morning before the Rallye start, and was led by Joe McGavin who designed the routes. Thereafter, Larry Gersten lined up each car under the covered portal at the front of Camelback Lodge for timed, staged send-offs, with approximately five minutes between each car's departure.

A series of oil patches and messy drippings remained as a curious legacy from this vehicular line up in front of the Lodge. After all, these were classic British cars, and such oil patches should have been expected!

Scoring for each Rallye participating car was based on the degree to which, at the end of the scenic tour route, a car's odometer reading matched the route designer's planned mileage; the ability of each driver and navigator to correctly answer written questions, and the number of guidebook chevron boxes correctly checked by a team.

#### Gymkhana!

Gymkhana has always been a crowd pleaser at AHSTC annual Encounters. This year was no exception when the noisy competition got started Friday afternoon. Gymkhana is a type of motorsport that involves precise driving through a predetermined course laid down with orange traffic cones and other markers. The goal is to navigate the course as quickly and accurately as possible, requiring a combination of agility and car control. The focus is precision driving, close-in handling, and timely acceleration rather than outright speed.



This year we had 13 drivers participate in the Gymkhana. Drivers were required to wear helmets. All cars are required to have seat belts. Prior to making each run, the cars were inspected by George Baxter, the event's Technical Director. (George is member from AHSTC Philadelphia Region and a veteran of many Gymkhanas.) Other than these safety measures, no other modifications to the cars were needed. Drivers were invited to walk the course prior to the start to familiarize themselves with track layout. The course proved challenging; its tight curves and closely spaced traffic cones demanded attention. Fortunately, all drivers survived unscathed and cars left undamaged.

The track this year was laid down on Camelback's lower snowtubing parking lot, empty this time of year, which proved to be a great playground for drivers, and afforded clear views for onlookers; even better for those spectators who climbed the nearby bluff looking down on the course, providing a bird's eye view of competition.
